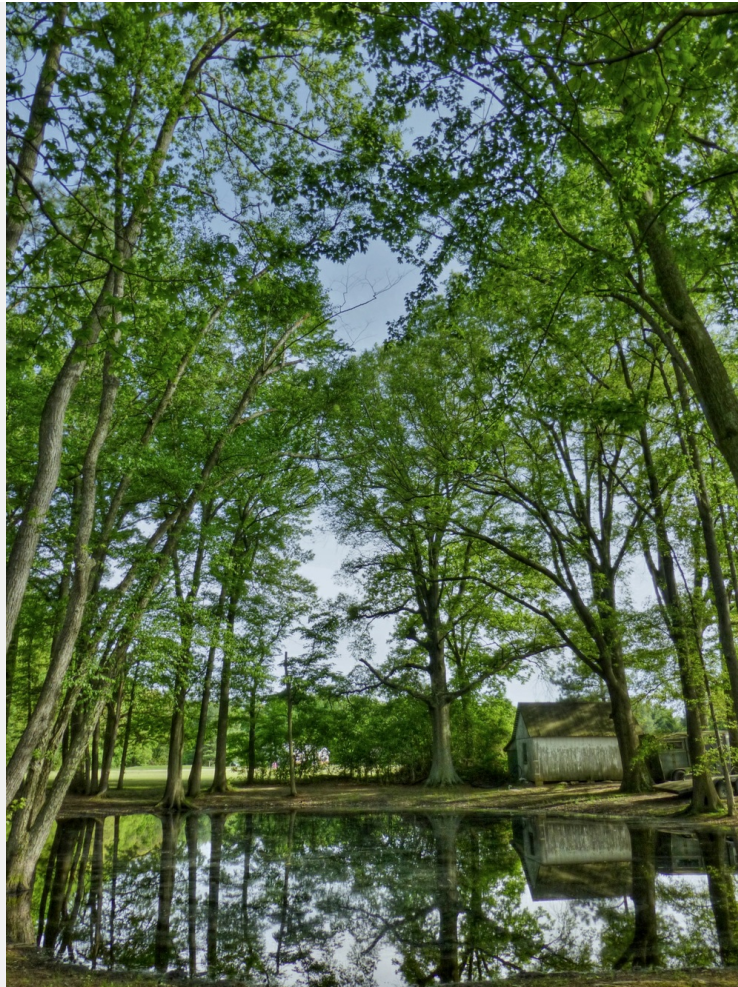


1/5 **Seeking Green (and I'm looking to COLLABORATE)**

Solution
